Hopefully, you were able to attend one of the neighborhood meetings held this month. Kat, our Executive Director, presented a lot of information about Green Hills' ongoing activities. There were many questions and discussions during these meetings. Some of the items included personnel changes and staffing, marketing, capital planning, dining services, healthcare and home health services, grounds, tree removal, life enrichment and pool usage.

It was indicated that thirty items from the 5-year strategic plan were started and that the Long-Range Planning Committee is currently working on the next 5-year plan (2027-2032).

The Technology Committee has decided that the Technology Club should be a Technology Assistance Group to help people with cell-phones, computers, emails, or associated problems involving informational or communication issues. Stay tuned for more information in this regard.

Progress on the Maples expansion was discussed. We expect schematics to be prepared by January 2023 and cost factors determined so that we can vote on whether or not to continue the project.

It was also indicated that our wonderful Chimes Editor, Molly Ethridge, will be retiring from that task in December of this year. We are looking for a new editor, so if you have appropriate computer skills and an interest in serving Green Hills, please let us know if you would be willing to take on this task.



BOOK REPORT A Neighborhood of Eagles By Norm Rudi

This article was in the works a few months ago, but it is especially appropriate that it's appearing now. We dedicate it to the memory of Norm Rudi, who died as this was going to press.



My uncle Ken served as a gunner (usually tail, but occasionally waist) in a B-17, flying missions out of England and headed to strategic locations in Germany. A few years ago I was able to read his record of the 30+missions that he flew. I was amazed that this uncle, who was such a funny, happy-go-lucky person, had come back from all those scary missions, and even a bailout in an engine fire, unscathed (physically at least).

In Norm Rudi's book you can read all about the WWII experiences of nine men with Ames connections. Bob Stafford, late husband of

Ginny, is the first person featured. (Both Norm Rudi and Ginny Stafford are Green Hills residents.) Lt. Stafford not only provides his pilot's log, but tells us what it felt like to fly over the beautiful European landscapes, and then drop bombs on their target.


Several of the other eight servicemen whose experiences are covered in the book are names familiar to Ames residents: Dean Huston, Arthur Ketelsen, William Singer, Robert Underhill. Nearly all of these stories include a log of their flights, whether as pilot or bombardier or navigator, or even in intelligence. Rudi gives us background on each of the men as well, which makes for compelling stories. It's a great read and Norm Rudi has done a wonderful service by interviewing these men and getting their stories in print.

This book is in our Green Hills library, and is shelved with the new books on the counter under the windows. These stories will warm your heart, and perhaps bring back memories of your time in the service or of those you know who served in WWII.

Are Green Hills mugs languishing in your kitchen cupboards?

Germinating Bird Seed Must Be Stopped! Another control conundrum for the Grounds committee:

We continue to have a problem with birdseed blowing/falling on the ground and germinating. This is especially an issue with the thistle seed that our Goldfinches love. I think everyone enjoys seeing the birds at Green Hills, but we need to ask those feeding the birds to help with this problem.

Please either purchase bird seed that is already sterilized or sterilize it before putting it in your feeders.

To sterilize the seed, simply put it in a pan in the oven for 30 minutes at 300 degrees. This essentially cooks it and stops it from germinating. This will not change any of the nutritional value of the seed.

Please help control weeds on our grounds!
